In 1987, the Las Vegas Catholic Worker hosted the first National Catholic Worker Gathering at Bishop Gorman High School on Maryland Parkway. Now, almost thirty years later, for the fourth time we will come together to share, celebrate, act and renew our personal and collective commitments to the Catholic Worker vision of gospel nonviolence.

This year's gathering is entitled, "Creating a New Society in the Shell of the Old," and will include a variety of workshops bound to speak to an array of interests. Reflective of the Catholic Worker practice of "clarification of thought," these Round Table Discussions will be facilitated by Catholic Workers and friends who bring experience, wisdom and passion to their topics.

Topics include the influences of the holy examples of St. Benedict and Theresa of Lisieux, St. Francis and Pope Francis.

- Although rarely consulted or listened to, people on the social margins are the best source of information and ideas about the issues facing them.
- Skilled listening is possible only when one is actively cultivating self-awareness and regular habits of reflection.


